Mudita School

(Education cannot stop):

One of the most affected victims of the COVID-19 crisis is children from marginalised communities who now have no access to schools and online education. Despite the outbreak of the virus since July 2020, we kept mudita school running in these difficult situations in three different villages, for our beneficiaries - maintaining protective measures and keeping our children safe during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Mudita Happiness Kit

Covid-19 has threatened the future of thousands of children, particularly those from the disadvantaged communities due to closure of schools. They are at the risk of dropping out of education for having missed a major part of their academic lessons. The children who need extra academic support are the most vulnerable and may never return to school, eventually falling into the trap of exploitation like child labour and child marriage. When schools close, children risk losing their learning, support system, food, and safety, and it is particularly caused great harm to the most vulnerable children. They are paying the heaviest price of the most jarring impacts of COVID-19. We are at Mudita School trying to help the children from marginalised communities to keep them healthy and in the touch with education by distributing Mudita Happiness Kit which is packed with nutritious food items, immunity boosters, and educational materials. So far still today we have reached 1196 families in rural area. Our aim to help 3000 family who are deprived of education and good food due to COVID-19 crisis.



Mudita COVID-19 Relief Work

The COVID-19 crisis made it hard for underprivileged people living on daily wages, as they continue to struggle to ensure daily meals for their families, especially rural communities continue to struggle with access to food, medical care, and other essential services to survive in this crisis. Millions of dependent daily wage-earners lose their work, struggling to meet the basic food to survive this crisis. We are working consistently to provide COVID-19 relief support to the daily wage and migrants' worker from rural areas whose life is deeply hit by the COVID-19 crisis. As a part of the COVID-19 relief work, mudita school providing rations to support the most vulnerable families. So far still today, mudita school has been able to reduce the hardship faced by over 5,642 people (987 families) from the marginalized communities. Our goal to support 1500 families.
